Chapter 4:

Did you find the arguments based on our unity at a time and through time convincing? Why or why not? Which points made in this chapter best help you clarify your understanding of what it is to be human?

Chapter 5:

Did this chapter help you better grasp the nature of the soul? Why or why not? Was the classical understanding of "substance" new to you? Did it make sense? If so, what are some implications for your understanding of your life and work?

Chapter 6:

Have you encountered this understanding of the body before? If so, where? Does it make sense? Why or why not? If it does, what are some implications in relation to your life and work?

Chapter 7:

Were any of these defenses of neurotheology ones you have heard or thought of before? If so, which ones? Do you think the author succeeded in showing them to be inadequate? Why or why not?

Chapter 8:

Were any of these objections to dualism ones you have heard or thought of before? If so, which ones? Do you think the author succeeded in showing them to be inadequate? Why or why not?
